Narrative:

Please briefly (one page or less) describe changes (as compared to FY22), trends, or highlights in your institution's FY23 extramural funding total(s).

Federal – Our focus continues to be adding individual faculty federal awards. The decrease shown in this category compared to FY22 is primarily due to these grants spanning multiple years, so if they are fully obligated when first issued, they are reported on the year they are awarded and there are no new ones to report in FY23. The Combating Overdose Through Community-level Intervention initiative received another \$3M in FY23, same as it did in FY22. The Washington/Baltimore High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area received \$4.8M in FY23, compared to \$5.9M in FY22.

State – State funding continues to see increases after the declines we saw in FY21 due to COVID-related budget cuts. Notable new state projects include research on the requirements set forth in SB 275 on the Family and Medical Leave Insurance (FAMLI) program and with the Career and Technical Education Committee on the Blueprint for Maryland's Future, both under the Jacob France Institute and funded by the MD Department of Labor. Substantial state restricted funding was also awarded in FY23 for the operations of the Schaefer Center for Public Policy.

Corporate – Funding in this category consists primarily of contracts from local developers interested in quantifying the economic impact of their proposed projects with the help of the Jacob France Institute.

Foundations – We also experienced an increase in non-profit awards, which saw substantial impacts in FY21 and FY22 due to COVID. Of note in this category are new awards from Maryland Legal Aid (Schaefer Center), The Abell Foundation (Human Trafficking Prevention Project) and the Paul Volcker Fund for the Future of Public Service (Next Gen Public Service Scholars).

Other – We continue to grow our partnership with the City of Baltimore, as noted by our involvement in the evaluation of neighborhood policing for the Baltimore Police Department (School of Criminal Justice). Also of note is our partnership with the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services on the Virginia Youth Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment Project (Center for Advancing Prevention Excellence).
