Federal – Our focus continues to be adding individual faculty federal awards. In FY22 UB received a new grant from the US Department of Justice for \$600k for the School of Law, Human Trafficking Prevention Project. We also received our first NASA award, a \$65k grant for the STEM Space Camp. The Combating Overdose Through Community-level Intervention initiative received \$3M in FY22 (compared to only \$2M M in FY21), accounting for most of the increase. This initiative allows our Center for Drug Control and Prevention to identify innovative solutions to the opioid crisis that move beyond traditional health and law enforcement policies. UBalt is also a first-time recipient of a \$250k Predominantly Black Institution (PBI) formula grant from the US Department of Education, dedicated to strengthening dual enrollment and providing additional support to transfer students.

State – State funding saw a rebound after the declines we saw in FY21 due to COVID-related budget cuts. Most projects that had been suspended or substantially cut last year saw their budgets reinstated in FY22.

Corporate – Two small corporate awards account for the increase this year. They were from local developers interested in quantifying the economic impact of their proposed projects with the help of the Jacob France Institute.

Foundations – We saw some stabilization of non-profit funding after the declines we experienced in FY21, most likely due to COVID impacts. Of note is the new partnership with the Family League of Baltimore and our Center for Families, Children and the Courts to provide a training academy for counselors, principals and other school leaders.

Other – While we continue to grow our partnerships with the City of Baltimore, as noted by our involvement in the City's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding evaluation, UB has also developed substantial new partnerships with other local jurisdictions. For example, the Schaefer Center for Public Policy has been tasked with supporting the Baltimore County Blue Ribbon Commission on Ethics and Accountability, while the Jacob France Institute developed economic development strategies for the City of Bowie and the Town of Edmonston, as well as an age-friendly action plan for the City of College Park.
