Narrative:

In order to be best informed for the presentation of this material to the Board of Regents and for use in USM reports, please briefly (one page or less) describe changes in your institution's FY20 extramural funding total as compared to FY19.

Federal – Our focus continues to be adding individual faculty federal awards. In FY20 UB received a new award from the US Department of Justice for \$450k for Dr. Frank (Weifeng) Xu in the School of Criminal Justice. This is the first DOJ award since 2016. In addition, the Combating Opioid Combating Opioid Overdose Through Community-level Intervention initiative continues to thrive, receiving \$4.5M in FY20 (compared to \$3.5M in FY19). This initiative allows our Center for Drug Control and Prevention to identify innovative solutions to the opioid crisis that move beyond traditional health and law enforcement policies.

State – New and renewal awards from state agencies also increased in FY20. State support for the HIDTA Heroin Coordinator program increased from \$95k in FY19 to \$371k in FY20 (\$275k increase), with the addition of 4 regional coordinators to support the state-wide coordinator role. The Schaefer Center for Public Policy and the Jacob France Institute performed several new and expanded program evaluation studies for state agencies, including the Department of Health, the Department of Aging, Maryland Insurance Administration, Department of Labor, Department of Human Services and the Department of Transportation.

Corporate – No substantial change from FY19 to FY20.

Foundations – While we have experienced a substantial reduction in the number and value of awards from private foundations in FY20, one substantial award of note is \$256k from the Laura and John Arnold Foundation to the Schaefer Center for Public Policy for the purpose of assessing community perceptions about the six-month pilot test of the Aerial Investigative Research (AIR) program in Baltimore.

Other – While we continue our partnerships with the City of Baltimore, UB has started substantial new partnerships with other local jurisdictions. The Center for Drug Policy and Prevention is assisting the Howard County Office of Emergency Management with preparation for all-hazards events and disasters through planning, outreach, training and exercises. In addition, the Jacob France Institute won a competitive contract to conduct a comprehensive economic development strategic action plan for Prince George's County.
