# THE EXPERIENTIAL REQUIREMENT

## LEARN WHILE DOING

Hands on learning is central to our curriculum at UB School of Law. We seek to ensure that each graduate is ready to transition from law student to law practitioner. The experiential requirement allows you to gain real experience while earning your law degree.

**SIX C R E D I T S** - All six credits may be earned in a "live client" setting such as a clinic, or you may combine three credits of "live client with three credits of a simulation or skills class or activity".

Note:
